

Empowering Students to make "Smart Choices"

ith tens-of-thousands of Jews searching for answers in other religions, it's not surprising that I received a call from Amy, a college coed who was confused by religious remarks made by her dorm supervisor. I explained the importance of using critical thinking to get a second opinion and gave her some skills that enabled her to make an informed decision and cope with peer-pressure. A few weeks later Amy called to thank me and said, "I shared your advice and helped another student who was involved in some risky behavior that he was exposed to on the internet."

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Research by renowned New York University sociologist Richard Arum shows that students are sorely lacking the critical thinking skills needed to make important life decisions and deal with major issues including peer pressure, anti-Israel propaganda, and religious harassment.

Jews for Judaism is committed to innovation and to addressing the current threats to Jewish survival. As

part of Jews for Judaism's strategic planning process, we examined our educational program model. We determined that if we could maintain our core mission of being a Jewish response to cults and fundamentalist proselytizing - and also empower Jewish youth to apply critical thinking skills to real world situations - we would be able to make an even larger impact on the Jewish community.

This was the genesis for the development of our **Smart Choices** Critical Thinking initiative. Our vision is to bridge critical thinking from the classroom to the real world, empowering students with an analytical framework to apply critical

thinking skills across the range of difficult choices they confront every day. Established on a foundation of Jewish wisdom, our 5 step program will empower students, increase leadership skills and develop Jewish awareness and pride.

One of my most recent and upsetting experiences happened about a month ago. My little brother is really involved in my mom's church and a small group of boys comes over once a week.

This particular time one of the youth pastors – a bona fide fundamentalist – started talking to me about religion.

I actually like to talk about religion because I think it's really interesting, but this guy was rude and out of control. He kept interrupting me and would not stop.

We talked until almost midnight, and what was really upsetting was that my mom didn't help me out or ask the guy to leave. I know I should have said something like, "That's enough, go home now, I have a lot of homework," but I had never been so attacked in my own home before, not even by my mom, so my mind sort of froze.

I think I have been holding down the fort here pretty well but I honestly feel much more prepared because of your talk. My personal mission at home is to help my little brother not become so extreme. I got him to willingly watch the "Jesus Camp" documentary on your website with me, and he was healthily disturbed by it. I think he has a good head on his shoulders.

Atonement in One Minute What Does the Bible Really Say?

Jews can no longer obtain atonement because the ancient Jewish Temple was destroyed and animal blood sacrifices can no longer be offered. For proof, they invoke Leviticus 17:11, claiming that it says "There is no remission of sin without the shedding of blood." In fact, this quote does not exist in the Jewish Bible.

The best response is to recognize that missionaries are only presenting their one-sided viewpoint that is based on a misunderstanding of Torah. Now let's examine the true biblical relationship between atonement and blood sacrifice more thoroughly.

First, not all sins required blood

sacrifices. The fourth chapter of Leviticus clarifies that only *unintentional* sins required sacrifices and sacrifices are ineffective if they are not accompanied by sincere remorse and repentance.

The key elements to atonement have always been remorse and repentance.

The key elements to atonement have always been remorse and repentance. Additionally, the prophet Hosea in chapter 14 instructed Jews to offer their prayers in lieu of sacrifices.

Finally, Leviticus 17:11 is misrepresented by missionaries

based on the New Testament passage in Hebrews 9:22 which says, "One may **almost** say, all things are cleansed with blood, and without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness." Ironically, the inclusion of the word "almost" actually supports the Jewish view that only unintentional sins required a sacrifice.

The prophet Malachi sums up the biblical view of atonement in chapter 3 verse 7, "Return to Me, and I will return to you." In other words, there is no need for an intermediary; God is accessible whenever we turn directly to Him.
